12. Significant contributions made by IQAC during the current year(maximum five bullets)

• In order to inculcate culture of oratory and writing, 'Mantrana Debating Society, DAV (PG) College' was established on August 9, 2019. More than 100 students became members. It has since then, organized various intracollege as well as intercollege debate and essay competitions. It has also organized 'VoW Mantrana National Debate Championship 2019' in collaboration with 'Valley of Words

International Arts and Literature Festival'. A 'Civil Service Forum' was established on October 25, 2019 to facilitate guidance to like minded students preparing for various competitive exams, such as UPSC PCSJ, and SSB etc.

- An educational tour to 'Lal Bahadur Shastri National Academy of Administration, Mussoorie' was organized on 27 September 2019. We had a team of 21 students and 5 faculty members.

Mantrana Reading Room' was established to provide a space to students to enhance their creative skills, hold constructive dialogues etc apart from reading. An impressive collection of 120 literary books was donated by 'Valley of Words Organization'. Mantrana society has added more than 100 books apart from maintaining a section of journals and magazines. Various standard books and notes have also been added by Mantrana to facilitate students preparing for competitive exams.

The college is affiliated to the HNB Garhwal (A Central University) all UG/PG programmes being run in the college as per the syllabus prescribed by the university. However, for effective curriculum delivery, the following steps are taken:

- Orientation programme/induction classes are organized at the beginning of the first semester to explain the curricular aspects and make the students familiar about the college curriculum, examination process, CBCS.
- During first week, students are briefed about the institution, its Vision and Mission and also about the important academic systems such as CBCS and University/UGC, attendance classes, weightage of attendance and various types of scholarships available in the college.
- Regular classes as per timetable take place in the college.
- A detailed teaching plan is chalked out, dividing the teaching into practical and assignments and periods are arranged accordingly.
- Classes are held regularly and teachers strive to complete the syllabus in time.

Library is equipped with proper study materials and resources etc.

college library has valuable reference books section too. • Students given extra time after regular class to clear doubts/ queries related to their course/subject. • To provide practical knowledge to students, visits to other prestigious institutions, industrial study tours and field trips are conducted. • To enrich their classroom learning, students are encouraged to participate in Debate, Speech and Essay writing competitions, Literary Festivals. • Through IQAC meetings monitoring of effective curriculum delivery is done. • Class rooms are equipped with ICT facilities and students make their presentations on projectors. • Interactive learning is promoted among students through group discussions, quizzes etc. • The mentioned steps ensure that teaching is not confined to merely completing the syllabus; rather it is complemented by a multi-pronged approach that makes the curriculum effectively. Teachers encourage students to opt for projects, dissertations, presentations and participating group work at UG levels. • PG/Ph.D. students of Economics and Sociology completed dissertations/thesis on the present socio-economic scenario and its impact on local, State, and National as well as international issues. • Project assignments are given to students which help the students to connect themselves to the outside world and have a dynamic understanding of the same.

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2.5.2 - Reforms initiated on Continuous Internal Evaluation(CIE) system at the institutional level

DAV PG college has initiated and implemented reforms on Continuous Evaluation (CIE). Admission process is merit based and has gone completely online. Institution monitors admission decisions under the following criteria - according to merit list, cut off marks, fulfilling reservation quota and number of seats allotted by the university. 90 of the seats are reserved for Uttarakhand resident applicants. All subjects taught follow a 3 year semester system for UG courses while PG professional courses follow a 2 semester system. To promote diversity an orientation program is specially conducted by various courses for individuals of diverse economic, cultural, religious, gender, linguistic backgrounds and physically challenged. Special relaxation on cut off marks is given to SC/ST candidates. Evaluation process post admission for UG Candidates: • Internal assessment : 30 (for each subject) required to appear for external assessment • External (university) assessment - 30 marks (for each subject) PG degrees is a 4 semester system in each educational session there are 2 semesters. 75% attendance is required to appear for semester exams. Evaluation process consists of 2 Internal assessments each of 20 marks per course. These marks are added to the external assessment which is for 60 marks LLB admissions are also merit based and follow the same semester criteria For B.Ed admission : Admission process for B.Ed is done through entrance test conducted by HNB Garhwal University Registration and merit list is made by the department of the institution. The admission process is conducted for seats allotted to various reservation quota. To create an environment conducive to learning and development the college has implemented innovative approaches like interactive sessions, remedial classes for under achievers, counseling their personal problems and providing support to sort out their learning difficulties. Students are also given leadership roles to make them capable for taking initiatives. To address barriers

student learning, teachers have implemented a 2 steps: 'Identify ba as observation, assessment , quizzes, student feedback forms 'Commu staff meetings, student discussions. Teachers have leveraged IC encouraging students to develop effective presentation and present seminars. The internet access is given free of cost to all the peopl during the working days. Department has ET resource center which is with audio, visual facilities like TV, OHP, LCD computers as teachin aids. People teachers make use of technologies for their lesson p power-points. Likewise the faculty members transact curriculum by based equipment and accessories. Self financed courses like PGDJMC BSC(IT), MA (Mass Communication), MA (Education) are also offered i college. The admission criteria for these courses is merit based and at least 40 in the qualifying exam. During COVID-19 the evaluation p not hampered. All assignments were given to and submitted by student All faculties applied ICT in their teaching-learning process effec

The installation was done in two stages. In first stage 60 KWH capacity solar panels (25KWH25KWH10KWH) was installed and the electrical energy produced by the panel is being supplied to State Grid and state adjust it with the electricity unit consumed by college and surplus energy is utilized in fulfilling its own demand. In that sense under the Corporate Social Responsibility the college is helping state in production of electrical energy. The project was funded by The Government of India, under Alternative Source of energy programme. The second stage of installing 60 KWH (20KWH20KWH20KWH) was funded by ONGC under its CSR scheme and gave the necessary support that was required for using the solar energy. The energy produced by the solar plant fulfill the electrical need of campus throughout the year as the solar energy produced is converted into electrical energy by using batteries through inverters. So we can say DAV (PG) COLLEGE DEHRADUN is self-sufficient in its power requirement by utilizing the solar energy (alternative source of energy) produced by the college.
